When we moved into Lamanver Farm our solicitor offered us a bundle of dusty obsolete legal documents. They date back to 1732. This of course predates the construction of Argal Reservoir which I always understood to have been built in 1939. Having read some of these old documents –often then prompted to the vast resources on the internet- it is clear that 1939 tells only part of the story.

PART 1 FALMOUTH WATER ACT 1930 and THE ANTER BROOK

This Act of Parliament is fundamentally about the Argal Reservoir. I think the annotation top Left refers to King George V. Unedited extracts in the right hand margin in the sequence in which they appear.

"The Anter brook " means the brook now flowing past Argal Mill into the reservoir of the Company known as the No. 4 reservoir;

10. The powers of the Company for the compulsory purchase of lands for the purposes of this Art shall cease on the thirtieth day of September nineteen hundred and thirty-three.

The Parish tithe maps of 1840 show a meandering faint blue line with arrow heads annotating direction of flow . This must be the Anter Brook although it is not formally named on the map. It rises in a field alongside 'ANTERtavis below Longdowns before dropping below Goodagrane, through Trevone, through Helland Mill then down to Argal Mill which is shown located beyond the present dam where the brook feeds College Reservoir.
